### Minister's Musings

### Valuing Nuance...The Work of Love

Humans use language to communicate. To make our lives simpler, we name things and group them together. Categorizing things makes it simpler for us to understand them and express our understanding to others. I recently learned that people from The Islands have ONE type of apple available to them. So, when they visit a grocery store in The States, it is overwhelming to understand ALL the varieties. Who knew!? If you have only ever tasted Red Delicious apples, biting into a Granny Smith would be suprising. Broad generalizations make some things simpler. Nuance, while adding complexity, enhances our communication. Sometimes we don't even know what we don't know until someone introduces us to something new.

As a person who started studying the Bible as a child, I have always loved the ways it made me feel empowered. However, when I was in seminary, I started learning the extensive ways the Bible has been used to oppress. I made friends with a Jewish student who told me unimaginable stories about how Christians had, and still do, use the New Testament to justify violence against her people. Until I listened to her stories, I had no idea! I had never

experienced the harm personally, I only knew Jesus' stories from the perspective of a Caucasian, American, middle class, female. She helped me see how damaging those stories can be if they aren't expressed with the nuance of a different perspective.

If the Bible says Jews did a harmful thing to Jesus, it is a logical leap to assume all Jews carry that culpability. But that leap fails to account for the fact that the Jews are God's chosen people. Jesus was himself a Jew. The Messiah was sent to the Jews, and the gospel was first preached to Jews. The covenant God made with Abraham and his descendants had no expiration date. When I teach the stories that include caricatures about the Jews, I, personally understand the Jews to represent all of us. I lump myself in with the faulty religious superiority of the elite pharisees. But I don't always say that. The way I speak about these stories can carry the unintended consequence of leading people to assume I think Jews are bad people. I need to do better. I need to be more intentional to include nuance. It might not matter to those with white skin, but it could be a matter of life and death for those who are brown.

On Monday our country will celebrate the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. Day. The fact that our nation celebrates this man of faith, demonstrates our recognition of the value of his ministry and message. Yet, the battle for racial equality and reconciliation is far from finished. At a time when political dividing lines feel nearly insurmountable, the topic of race feels terrifyingly inflammatory. We prefer to silence challenging topics. Our world has polarized and insulated itself in echo chambers on both sides of almost all debates, including racial reconciliation. As Christians, we have a responsibility to grow in our ability to step out of our silos, away from broad categorizations, and move into the complexity of nuance.

If we want to love people, we must understand their wounds. There are wounded people on both sides of every debate. The Spirit of God moves to heal the wounded. To follow Christ means stepping into uncomfortable places, listening to people with different opinions, hearing the wounded, loving those with whom we disagree. We will never all agree. That is not the goal. Love is the goal. Love requires understanding. Understanding requires proximity. When was the last time we worked to understand, rather than be understood by, someone different? How can we position ourselves to love better?
