Lenten Confessions

You may not know this, but The Episcopal Church offers an Anglican rite of confession called The Reconciliation of Penitents. If you are curious, it can be found in the Book of Common Prayer, beginning on page 447. Unlike in the Roman Catholic rite, the Episcopal version is not considered a sacrament, and it is not obligatory. However, many Episcopalians embrace this rite as part of their Lenten practice. Minister's Musings

Sanitary Sacraments

Dear friends, ever since our world faced its most recent global pandemic, the church has wrestled with the safest way to administer the sacrament of Holy Communion. We all remember what it was like when our gatherings were restricted entirely and the ongoing concern we felt when, on returning, we masked during worship. We all desire to receive The Eucharist, and we all need to know that we are as safe as possible. Health in our world will remain an ongoing concern. Throughout the COVID-19 ordeal, scientific studies were undertaken to learn, assess, and determine the best way for the church to move forward. A year ago, The Diocese of Virgina issued a statement for practices moving forward based off the findings of these results. Last week, I attended a training with our diocesan bishops, and they asked the priests to bring the churches into compliance with that statement.

The essence of the report states that drinking wine directly from the chalice is the cleanest, safest, way for the whole congregation to receive. Many people feel that dipping the bread into the wine is safer than sharing the cup, but fingertips inevitably get into the chalice, and they are far less clean. Chalice bearers wipe and turn the cup after each person has been served and the silver of the chalice itself acts as a protection against germs. In essence, sipping is safer than dipping.


The change we will be making is to encourage everyone to sip directly from the chalice. Intinction (dipping) will now ONLY be done by the priest who will use hand sanitizer before serving, limiting the number of fingers inside the chalice. We prefer for everyone to sip but understanding how uncomfortable that is for people who have never done so. Consequently, intinction will remain an option ONLY from the priest's hands.

When you come to the altar rail, you will have three options for the chalice. First, you can raise your hands as usual, receive, and consume the bread before using your hands to guide the chalice to your lips to taste the wine. Second, you can use one hand to point to your other palm, indicating your desire for intinction, at which point I will dip the bread into the wine and hand it to you for consumption. Third, if you prefer to take the bread and abstain from the wine altogether, you can consume the bread and then cross your hands over your chest, so the chalice bearer knows your wish. Be assured, those who come to the altar desiring the sacrament, having consumed the bread, have received the full grace of the sacrament (BCP. 457).

Most of us have attended church so long that we participate in the liturgical movements with very little thought. Our bodies perform their way through the liturgy by rote. Changing our well-worn habits can be difficult. Even if our hearts are willing, retraining our bodies can take effort. I expect this transition

to take some time to feel comfortable. I am grateful for your willingness to trust our church's leadership and bend our practices to ensure the safety of the whole community. May we be patient with one another as we practice something new together!






Lenten Lessons
