God truly does answer prayer! Your hospitality, warmth, and the partnership I already feel in the work we have begun is a genuine gift.

"Minister's Musings"

Saint Mary the Virgin

Thursday, the fifteenth of August, is The Feast of Saint Mary the Virgin. Episcopalians, like most Anglicans, express extreme diversity in our understanding of and reverence for Mother Mary. For our Roman Catholic brothers and sisters, Assumption Day (the day Mary is honored for being bodily received into heaven) is a "solemnity," a "holy day of obligation". In other words, they will attend Mass to receive the eucharist and they will refrain from work. Assumption Day is one of only six days with this type of weightiness, so it is a big deal. Episcopalians revere Mary, but since we do not universally accept the theology of the assumption, our observance of this feast day can be easily overlooked. But Mary is a tremendous part of the gospel story and what her life teaches should not be overlooked.

Mary's life teaches us two particularly important lessons that we would do well to emulate. She was a willing servant of God. And she was a bearer of God.

While Mary is perhaps most well known for The Magnificat, her song of praise

for God's faithfulness, her ability to praise God came from her willingness to say "yes" to God. When the angel came to her, prophesying her future role in God's plan for salvation, she agrees. There is no recorded hesitation or questioning in the encounter. In fact, her immediate approval of God's plan is called "Mary's fiat" which comes from the Latin word which means "let it be". For a young girl to agree so quickly when experiencing an angel's visitation with an unimaginable prophetic message, we must conclude that she already saw herself as God's servant. Thirty years later her son would echo this same sentiment, kneeling in a garden. I wonder if our responses to God are the same.

Mary is also known at the Theotokos, or "God-bearer". She received Jesus into herself and her allowed her entire life to become about him. For the rest of her life and for two thousand years since, she has never been known apart from Jesus. If we are to follow her example, we too ought to bear Jesus in our lives in this world. I wonder if we are as known for our participation with Jesus as we are for the things we do apart from him.

The Collect of the Day

May the Holy Spirit, by whose presence Mary became the God-bearer, give you grace to carry the good news of Christ. And the blessing of God almighty, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be among us and remain with us always. Amen.






We will be packing weekend food bags for 30 to 36 children from Madison County that live with food insecurity.
