"Minister's Musings"

Labor Day Recreation

Labor Day weekend is upon us once again. For some, this day hearkens the end of summer break and a return to the grueling Fall school and sports schedule. For other it's a reminder that the days are about to start getting shorter. From many, it's an excuse to have one more last big party of the season, grill something tasty and enjoy friends and family.

Most people don't pay attention to the origin of the holiday or know the celebration's initial intent. Originally, in 1894 to be exact, when Grover Cleveland signed the law, making Labor Day a national holiday, it was to commemorate the work of the Labor Unions. Before that era, people worked unbelievable hours in untenable conditions. This holiday is specifically in celebration of the decision of lawmakers to codify an eight-hour workday with an expectation that eight hours are required for rest and the other eight hours in every working day should be give to recreation. "Recreation." It's a word worthy of a moment's attention as we embark on this celebratory long weekend.

Recreation these days is a word often relegated to children. Americans who pride themselves on their Protestant Ethic, tend to view recreation as irrelevant in the face of all the work that needs to be produced. Perhaps it is that overattention to labor which has caused many in the more modern generation to prize relaxation and ease over the sweaty discipline of hard work. Either way, an argument could be made that both polarized responses need tempering. Recreation is, in fact, re-creation. It is meant to be a replenishing of what has been spent. God, as the first Creator, made people in the divine image to be co-creators. The creation story indicates God's own value of the enjoyment over what has been produced and the value of patterned resting. Play, relaxation and amusement are all valuable ways for the human person to be energized to begin labor afresh.

God prizes humans in our humanity and values our created necessity for both rest and refreshment. Americans, historically, have also honored this for ourselves and for all the citizens of this country, This weekend, as we engage in the task of recreation, let us recognize and celebrate the fact that our country and our God revere this part of our common humanity. And let us participate with joy in whatever way is available to us this weekend.

The Collect for Labor Day

Almighty God, you have so linked our lives one with another that all we do affects, for good or ill, all other lives: So guide us in the work we do, that we may do it not for self alone, but for the common good; and, as we seek a proper return for our own labor, make us mindful of the rightful aspirations of other workers, and arouse our concern for those who are out of work; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

Bishop's VISIT



As the cost of the printed booklet has increased, we have decided to allow individuals to choose how best to access this resource for themselves.

For some, a printed resource will always feel more accessible. If that sounds like you, the company provides two different sizes. There is the small booklet, roughly 3"x5" in size which includes eight copies over two years for \$25. There is a large print edition that is 8"x11" and includes four copies over a single year for \$25.

For others, a digital resource is simpler. The website provides free options in multiple forms. There is a daily email, a daily podcast, an app, and an online edition.
