"Minister's Musings"

That Which Does Not Serve

Sunday is the feast day of St. Clare of Assisi. She is the female counterpart to St. Francis and established the "Poor Clares" in the eleventh century. She's a fascinating woman who, like most of the saints, lived an impressive life of devotion to God through challenging times and experiences. While there are many reasons to venerate St. Clare, this year I am struck by her hair.

Coming from an elite, powerful, and wealthy family, Clare was lauded for her beauty. Her affluent family was not impressed with her desire to leave them, for

a life marked by poverty and chastity. She fled at night to avoid detection, and to prove her resolve, she had St. Francis cut off her hair. In our world, this radical act does not translate. But at a time when long hair was a woman's mark of beauty, and when a woman's value was entirely linked with her beauty, a haircut was Clare's crossing of the Rubicon. Her determination to throw herself on God's grace by literally cutting off her human security was a tremendous act of faith.

Clare's humility, demonstrated by her choice to cut off her hair, is especially poignant this week. Sunday's Old Testament lesson is the Story of Absalom from Second Samuel, chapter 18. David's prideful son gets himself killed when his long hair becomes tangled in a tree, causing him to get stuck when his mule walked out from under him. Left hanging by his beautiful hair, Absalom was an easy target for the men who wanted to kill him. While his story is ridiculous, Absolom creates a striking juxtaposition against Clare.

Haircuts may or may not be our mark of sacrifice and humility. But they do provide a useful metaphor for helping us make choices to govern our lives. I don't think anyone would argue that Absalom would have made an excellent king, but if he hadn't been so vain about his hair, it is possible he would have defeated his father and won the throne. We all make choices every single day that define our priorities and shape our lives. Part of living into wisdom is discerning the priorities that do not serve us in fulfilling our call. Once we identify those things, we gain the opportunity to act in faith, like Clare, and cut them away.

Living a sacrificial life can be challenging at times. It's not always easy to let go of things we love, even if they aren't serving us. On the other hand, Absalom is a powerful cautionary tale. May we accept the grace necessary to cut away all that does not serve.




