"MINISTER'S MUSINGS"

What is "Stewardship"?

The topic of money at church always makes people squirm. Utilization of our finances, our time, and talents are some of the most private and sensitive areas of our lives. So why do we talk about them in our worshiping spaces where we should be focusing on God, feeling safe from scrutiny, and free from the mundane concerns of daily life? The answer is twofold. Church is a place where the spiritual and practical meet, so together we strive to feel safe enough to address both.

Spiritually, Christ invites us into the work of building the Kingdom. According to the Catechism, "The duty of all Christians is to follow Christ; to come together week by week for corporate worship; and to work, pray, and give for the spread of the kingdom of God." As a worshiping community, we desire to walk

alongside one another into this type of life. In God's kingdom, praying together isn't any different than stewarding resources together. Every part of our life is a spiritual.

Practically, maintaining a worshipping community, its buildings and resources, requires budgeting. For those new to The Episcopal Church, this practical reality is addressed through a yearly "stewardship campaign" where parishioners "pledge" to support the work of the church through regular contributions. "Pledge Sunday" is the day we all bring our intentions for the year, in the form of a pledge card, bless them, and praise God for the upcoming year's provisions. The vestry then calculates those provisions into the projected budget and makes decisions based on those calculations.

This time of weighing our individual resources and considering our participation in God's kingdom work for the upcoming year is sacred. As humans we are limited creatures, continually working to discern the best way to steward the resources available to us. As Christians, we trust God will both lead and provide for our own needs and those of our church. But it is not simple or easy. I am praying for each of us to have the clarity and faith to trust God to lead us all through this season and into our mission in 2025. I am grateful for your bravery and partnership!

Creation Care

This week on October 4th, the Feast Day of St. Francis, the Season of Creation technically ends, but Creation is a blessing and gift from God to all of us, and for the WHOLE year, not just a season. SO what does that mean for us people of The Way, as members of the Body of Christ, as those whom the world sees as Christians? The word human comes from *humus* and that, of course, means ground. In Genesis, every day God creates, and everyday, God says, "It is good.", and on the day that God created us out of the dirt of the Earth, in God's image, as a creator, not an abuser, God said, "It is VERY good; NOT because we alone were very good, but together we, the snakes, the spiders, the bats, and , my favorite, the tardigrades and all unicellular organisms, are Very Good!

The resources are varied and many; as always our God is a God of abundance, but we do not have to go farther than our Scriptures or, as Episcopalians, than our Book of Common Prayer. In Eucharistic Prayer C on p.370, the celebrant prays on our behalf," At your command all things came to be: the vast expanse of interstellar space, galaxies, suns, the planets in their courses, and this fragile earth, our island home....But we turned against you, and betrayed your trust; and we turned against each other"

It seems to me an acknowledgement in those statements that we are breaking the greatest commandment:

Mark 12:30-31 says, "And you must love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, all your mind, and all your strength. The second is equally important: Love your neighbor as yourself. No other commandment is greater than these."

I am a scientist and a deacon, and I am reminded that while science is important, it does not offer much hope; but like Dr. Katherine Hayhoe in <u>Rooted and Rising</u>, <u>Voices of Courage in a Time of Climate Crisis</u>, I look for my hope," not to my Science, but to my faith."

We are called as people of faith to care, watch over, and protect the least of these, those who by negligence or malice, the very least of these, our neighbors in our communities of buildings, rivers, air, and soil.

Creator God, bless and multiply these efforts so your will is done on earth as it is in heaven.



Parish House Deck Project

Most of you know that the parish house's deck, which has served us so well for many years, has finally given up the ghost. To ensure the safety of our congregants, it must be restored. The project has been budgeted to cost about \$20,000. The vestry has been able to utilize some surplus funds from our time without a priest and move some funds from the budget towards this project. While that is depleting what has been held in reserve, those reserves are intended for such a time as this. Consequently, we are currently within roughly \$5000 of our goal. Being so close to our goal has provided the ability to start the process of securing contractors. However, we still need help getting the final amount secured. The vestry would like to thank everyone who has already generously contributed to this project in both financial assistance and in prayer! Let's keep pressing towards the completion of our final goal!


Graves Picnic Joint Service
