#### "MINISTER'S MUSINGS"

#### The Holy Cross in an Age of the Sword

Conflict. Scroll through the top news stories of the day and you will see a steady stream of combat and competition. Whether it's the presidential debate, literal warfare on distant shores, school shootings, or athletes on the courts at the U.S. Open, our country and our world seem to be far more driven by rivalry than the peacemaking, humble, example of Jesus.

Saturday is Holy Cross Day, a holy feast of our Lord. It commemorates Christ's offering of himself to death in order that we might be saved. It is the celebration of the most basic message of Christianity, self-sacrificing love. In other words, The Feast of The Holy Cross stands in direct opposition to the world's system.

When we hear Jesus telling his followers to take up their cross, it's difficult for us to picture his meaning. We think of the cross as a pretty charm hanging on a necklace or the symbol at the top of the standard our eyes follow as we begin and end worship. But the cross, to the people of Jesus' day, was the symbol of state sanctioned murder. Would it help us picture this better if we imagined an electric chair or lethal injection? Grizzly, but honest. Perhaps our comfortable understanding of this revolutionary call needs to be shocked to hear it

accurately.

There is something broken about sinfulness that craves power and is willing to use violence to get it. If we're honest, we have all felt it at some point. It's an instinctual heat that rises in a visceral way when the right person pushes us in the right way, or something or someone takes our freedom or assaults our dignity.

This is why the gospel is revolutionary! It is a brazen declaration that sacrificial love, the kind of love that willingly sets down our rights and privileges on behalf of another, is the most powerful force in the world. This is why we are people of faith. We have to be if we want to uphold the cross with integrity. When our hands are full of the cross, they cannot hold anything else.

To Jesus, the cross was a symbol of persecution and loss. If our faith costs us nothing, if it risks nothing we value, if it only serves to reinforce our own sense of comfort, then we may be missing the cross. Faithful Christianity requires a continual reevaluation of ourselves and our practice of faith. We live and breathe a world's system that stands in opposition to the gospel. Our religion is constantly at risk of being watered down by the prevailing values of our times. Perhaps the best way we can honor this feast day is by asking God to give us a new vision for what it means for us to take up our cross.

Collect: Almighty God, whose Son our Savior Jesus Christ was lifted high upon the cross that he might draw the whole world to himself: Mercifully grant that we, who glory in the mystery of our redemption, may have grace to take up our cross and follow him; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, in glory everlasting. *Amen.*
